New digital and online services requirements: guidance for GP practices

From October 2021, amendments to the GMS and PMS regulations came into effect, bringing in to force a number of the agreements reached by NHS England (NHSE/I) and the British Medical Association (BMA) General Practitioners Committee (GPC) England in previous negotiations and published in January 2021 in Supporting General Practice in 2021/22. These new requirements were originally signalled and agreed in January 2019 as part of a five-year deal, published in Investment and evolution: A five-year framework for GP contract reform to implement The NHS Long Term Plan.

The Gender Identity Toolkit

The Gender Identity Toolkit is a practicable resource aimed at improving the availability of inclusive and equitable care for trans and non-binary patients at a crucial time. The toolkit consolidates statutory requirements and best practice guidance into an easily implementable, procedural resource. The toolkit highlights a range of common themes in trans and non-binary healthcare, from determining a suitable treatment pathway to updating a patient's name and/or gender marker.

Suspension of Dr Manjula Arora

Kent LMC had added its voice to those dismayed by the treatment of Dr Arora by the Medical Practitioner Tribunal Service. It is concerned that the decision to suspend Dr Arora evidences

A Message from the CCG: Long Covid Survey

NHS Kent and Medway Clinical Commissioning Group wants to further improve services for people living with Long Covid. In 2021, the CCG commissioned the post-Covid assessment service (sometimes called PCAS) for people with Long Covid.

More than 1,800 people have been referred, assessed, and then referred on for treatment by PCAS. In response to feedback from patients and staff, we are now looking to develop this assessment process and to improve local support and rehabilitation services for those with Long Covid across Kent and Medway.

We want to hear from GPs, clinicians and rehabilitation and support staff who have been supporting patients with Long Covid and those who have referred patients to the PCAS service. Please give us your views by completing this short online survey. **The survey closes on Tuesday, 31 May**. Message from CSU: EMIS training webinars

Our GP IT training team are offering the following EMIS modules as training webinars via Microsoft Teams. Clinical and non-clinical staff members are welcome to attend these sessions. Whether you are new to using EMIS or just need a refresher you are more than welcome to join us on the following dates:

- New user training 31 May 1pm to 2.30pm an overview training of the clinical system, including care record, appointment book, medication, workflow manager.
- Appointment book configuration 7 June from 1pm to 3pm adding and creating sessions/templates, planner management and appointments configuration.

- Clinical and Document Templates 10 June and 21 July from 1pm to 3pm enabling organisations/practices to manage and maintain clinical and document templates, these sessions will be split into two halves focusing on documents for the first half and clinical templates for the second half of the session.
- Searches and reports on 16 June from 9am to 11am creating searches and reports from practice specific information, include/exclude, difference between rules and features.
- Workflow modules on 21 June and 7 July from 10am to 12.30pm exploring all of workflow modules allowing the practice to fully utilise tasks, lab reports, document management and registrations.
- Concepts and protocols on 22 June from 12.30pm to 2.30pm creating concepts and protocols to aid in decision making processes and to trigger specific templates for clinical intervention.
